It also has some very, very bad, self-serving advice that's designed to make you spend as much on lawyers as possible. In essence, it says to hire the most expensive lawyer you find. Lawyers are what make the divorce process so horrible, especially for children. If there is any semblance of civility, and you can keep the lawyers out, you're both much better off. It's a prisoner's dilemma. If one side gets a lawyer, the

side which doesn't is f-ed. But if both sides do, you'll lose your life savings to them. That's by design. Litigation lawyers are a lobby which have drained trillions of dollars from the US economy. Every conflict escalates into a litigation where the price tag is set at how much money you have. Family law lobby is part of that. Most (not all) family law lawyers, like the author, are horrible people who work to turn the parents against each other, maximize conflict, and maximize revenues, profiting off of the backs of broken families. An arbitrator, mediator, or just about anyone else who doesn't turn this into a war is much better for everyone. The preview had some good advice if a divorce does explode. That's helpful -- most divorces do. Either side can force an explosion. But it's a breakup. If you follow basic human decency, and treat it the way you did in college, where you tried to be fair to the other side and go easy, you'll come out okay. If you follow the author's advice, you'll end up losing all of your money, and if you have kids, they'll be exposed to conflict until they're in college. On the other hand, someone like Susan will get a paycheck for a few hundred thousand if you can spare it, or however much you have if you can't.
