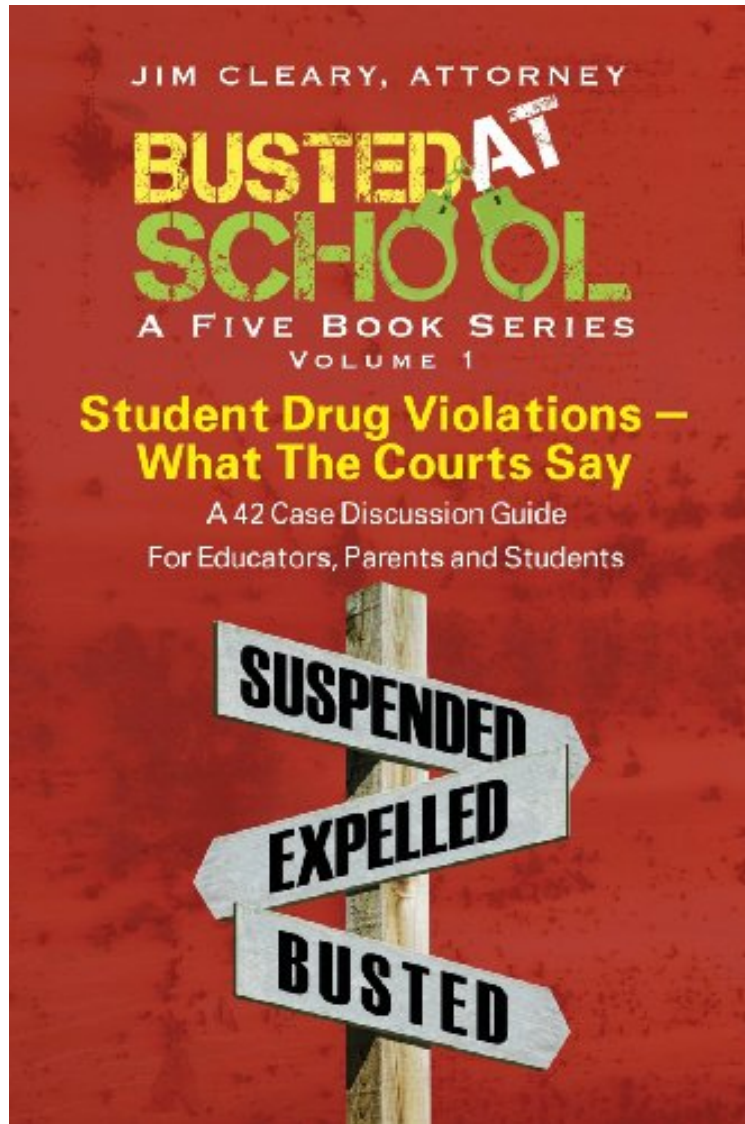

The first in the five-book BUSTED AT SCHOOL series is about students who are suspended, expelled or criminally prosecuted when they possess, use or sell drugs at school. Presented as a discussion guide for teachers, students and parents, the format of the book encourages all reader groups to discuss with others "what happened" to the students in these 42 interesting cases. After each case, the book presents a set of questions and discussion topics for each reader group. This learn-by-sharing approach works well for teachers, students and parents. Students can read the cases and then share "what happened" to the kids in these cases with their friends. They can share both in person and online using social media formats like Twitter, Facebook and others. School districts can set up online law discussion clubs for students and provide them with online learning courses about student drug violations at school. Parents can read the cases with their children and discuss the choices made by the students in the cases, and the legal consequences of those choices. Teachers and administrators can learn what the courts say about school district policies and procedures for handling drug violations. After each case the book presents take-away tips and a legal-bottom-line section for school officials. He started his legal career as an Assistant City Prosecutor in the Municipal Court of Kansas City, and then practiced criminal law for many years. His first discussion guide book for non-lawyers was a 70,000-word hard cover volume entitled *Prosecuting The Shoplifter - A Loss Prevention Strategy* (ISBN 0-409-95116), published in 1986 by Butterworth Publishers in Boston, MA. The book contained 78 actual court cases about shoplifting, used by retail merchants to discuss with each other and learn from this discussion. For ten years, as a side business to his law practice, Cleary was a national speaker at retail loss prevention conferences. With the BUSTED AT SCHOOL series, each book contains at least 40 court cases so readers can discuss and learn from them. From the Author My area is writing "law for the non-lawyer." While practicing law I wrote a book on the law of shoplifting for retail merchants. I presented training seminars on how to handle a shoplifting case, was a speaker at retail loss prevention conference. I also produced a training video for retail merchants. Working with non-lawyers to learn from law cases is my specialty. My five book series, BUSTED AT SCHOOL, is on what the courts say about student code of conduct violations. The first volume is now available and is on "Student Drug Violations - What the Courts Say" The four remaining volumes will be on what the courts say about 2) student bullying, threats and harassment. 3) student free speech issues. 4) searching students pockets, purses, backpacks, lockers and vehicles. 5) Twenty Miscellaneous Code of Conduct violations like bus misconduct, disruptive students, verbal altercations and more. The first step in understanding a situation is talking about it. My goal is to present topics my readers can "discuss with each other" on what the courts say about student code of conduct violations. By discussing these "law stories" with each other all readers will better understand the legal aspects. Schools will be able to establish more effective policies and procedures for handling code of conduct violations. Students will see how choices to violate the school district code of conduct have legal consequences. Parents will have code of conduct violation topics they can discuss with their kids in a non-judgmental way. Based on each volume I will write four online continuing education courses for K-12 teachers and offer them through a university. For school districts I will design online programs they can use as part of in-service training. School districts can establish "law chat rooms" for their students. For parents I will design online educational games for their middle/high school aged kids. Finally, depending on your feedback and suggestions, I will design CDs, DVDs, sets of flash cards and other educational products for the K-12 educational market. From the Back Cover Volume #1 is STUDENT DRUG VIOLATIONS - WHAT THE COURTS SAY. It is about students who were suspended, expelled or criminally prosecuted when they either possessed, used or sold drugs at school. After each case the book presents discussion topics for students, parents and educators. This learn by sharing approach works well for all reader groups. STUDENTS can both read and share with their friends "what happened" to the kids in these 42 cases. They can share these law stories both in person and using social media. PARENTS can read the cases and discuss them with their children in a non-judgmental way. This equips both parents and kids to talk effectively about how the choices made by the kids in these cases to get involved with drugs at school have legal consequences. SCHOOL DISTRICTS can set up online "law chat rooms" for their students. Also, as part of school district "in-service training" programs they can use online educational material I will develop based cases in each of the five books in the series. TEACHERS AND ADMINISTRATORS who read the five books in the series will find that after each of the cases in the books I provide discussion topics. The first is called "take away tips" for educators on school policies and procedures. The second discussion topic for educators is called "the legal bottom line." Also, teachers can take my online continuing education courses offered through a university. Finally, I will write articles and provide them at NO COST to both teacher and administrator organizations to provide to their individual members each month in the association newsletter.
